Colloquial terms might have been added to the dictionary to make them easier for non-native speakers to understand. The browser can not seem to know which dictionary to use when it is not told. Try using this instead: Dim d As New Dictionary(Of String, String) d.Add("Din 5482 Involute Spline", "DIN 5482-1 73 Edition, March 73") You could also try the LatinLangDict instead of the CultureInfo.Name, if you are fluent in another language and are sure that you need to search the LatinLangDict. Be aware though that the LatinLangDict can only detect a few common languages (I believe English is not one of them). However, it also contains all the data your example is missing, so it is a lot easier to understand the results you get.
