However, by the mid-1980s, the arcade industry faced a decline due to market saturation, competition from home consoles and personal computers, and rising costs of maintenance and operation. The arcade market recovered in the late 1980s and early 1990s with new genres such as beat 'em ups (e.g., Double Dragon), fighting games (e.g., Street Fighter), racing games (e.g., Out Run), and shooting games (e.g., Time Crisis). These games used advanced graphics, sound effects, motion simulators, and special controllers to attract players.

Since the late 1990s, the arcade industry has been declining in the West due to the increasing popularity and affordability of home consoles and online gaming. However, it has remained popular in Asia, especially Japan, where arcades offer a variety of genres such as music games (e.g., Dance

Dance Revolution), puzzle games (e.g., Tetris), card games (e.g., Pokémon), sports games (e.g., Mario Kart), and simulation games (e.g., Taiko no Tatsujin). Arcades have also become tourist attractions in some places.
